PRESSIE'S PRATTLE; Phil 48:

I was hoping a few members would write in with their 'counts of the 24 this year and save me the trouble but alas 'twas not to be. Thus, a small ramble from me would seem fitting, even if only to thank a few people and perhaps iterate what Nev228 said last month and that is to urge all monitors to introduce some new blood into the organisation.

John 232, came out of retirement, as it were, and did his 30th 24Hr, something only equalled by Chris and myself, he also celebrated 21 years working with the same controllers (Atajara) this year and has always spoken highly of the comradeship and cooperation he has been afforded. There have been a few similar liaisons over the years and one that comes to mind is Derek 40 and the BMW team. Dick 21 and the Ulyses MCC also forged a good working relationship. Unfortunately, you can count on one hand the number of controllers who took to ACRM and accepted us. I have to accept that in the early days some of our members were a bit brusque and attitude goes a long way to acceptance.

What a stuff-up!

I wouldn't have thought it possible for so many things to go wrong at the same time and the worst part about it is that it was entirely my fault. Here is how it all panned out. Chris got a phone call from Lynton from Gawler asking if we could assist at the ROSA trial on August the 3rd. Being our only weekend off in ten, I should have seen the writing on the wall but no; I said we would do it (mainly because it was close and only one day). Now what could go wrong with that you may ask, well you are about to find out. The repeater allocated to Mt Gawler was what I call Gawler Repeater 3 and is fitted to all our radios, or so I thought. Fortunately I carry spares that I never expect to need. Radio 1 is an Electraphone 3800 fitted permanently in the vehicle, which as it turned out had the wrong frequencies programmed into it. I'd never needed to use that channel before so it was untested. Radio two was a hand held which could be hooked up to an antenna so on it went, dialled up the channel and voila, there were the dulcet tones of the operator at base and the occasional word from the repeater location. By now we had heard that we were being sought as SOS Alpha was the only control that hadn't called in so we frantically tried to call base to let them know we were there but no answer, a quick check revealed that the TX frequency was wrong and it was now panic time so in the rush I dug out radio three, an Icom Pro 400 that I was fairly certain I had programmed correctly, and immediately began to hook it up. Got the polarity wrong didn't I and a fuse went, big deal, change polarity, throw in another fuse and all should be okay. Bummer the reason the fuse went

was because the reverse polarity protection diode in the radio had blown and was now a dead short so every new fuse blew. I can fix that, just remove the diode and make sure the polarity is correct for there is nothing to protect the radio with no diode. I opened the back on the Icom to find the back of the board and the diode is hidden underneath, now what? With Base still frantically calling for SOS Alpha I hooked up my Little Ripper 12 volt soldering iron and heated the pins on the diode until I could push them out through the board, dropping the diode into the cavity on the other side. After a little pushing a test with my multi meter showed the short had gone so I hurriedly connected the power and antenna up and we finally made contact with base, much to everyone's delight. Some 5 hours later we were home sipping on a coffee wondering what all the fuss was about. The next day I did a proper repair on the poor old Icom and spent hours reprogramming all our radios so that, with a bit of luck, we won't have to go through that again. Now the ironic bit, I also had a radio four, another small hand held but the paperwork mentioned 25 watt mobile as suitable for the location so didn't even try it until the show was over and bugger me – not a problem. The moral, never assume, it will always make an *ass* out of *u* and *me*. Answer: wrong info and thanks go to Dick 21 for standing in at the last moment and covering a control we never knew about until Saturday morning. From the info we got we had him come in for a 0900 hrs set up but in reality it was closer to 1100 hrs when he saw horses. Thus he had a bit of a wait, however he took it in his stride and got us out of the poop nicely, thanks Dick. I hope you can join us again on the weekend of the 27th-28th when it all happens again.

Upon arrival Saturday 'arvo, we were keen to get set up so we could shoot out and put the repeater up. After a bit of to and fro-ing twixt us and the officials we settled on a spot near the SAERA van (close to Start finish) so Nev & I went off to place the repeater in the spot we have used in the past. Now I'm sorry but we were left dumfounded at that because we had received a call from the Chief Steward, who had assessed a situation where a rider was experiencing symptoms of chest pains and possible heart attack so he requested an ambulance to the scene. Chris went over to the St. John Caravan and requested just that, she was met with "you will have to ring 000". With thoughts going through her head of "What the hell are you lot here for – if we are the ones who have to ring for an ambulance?" she came back to the van and relayed the story to me. I was getting my phone out to ring when one of the bit higher up the ladder in command at St. Johns came to the caravan to get more info, he must have figured out that the uniform he wore said St Johns and that maybe he should do something, whatever the reason, he did take the info and handle the call. Apart from first-aid personnel around the course, a four-wheel drive and first response vehicle there was already an ambulance at the ride. Maybe these ambos need to look at some pictures of ambulances and learn what they look like so they can study up on what they are for.

I'm sorry if this sounds a bit harsh but it seems that the purpose for St. Johns at these meetings has been forgotten and it is alarmingly clear that tragedy will be the end result. I don't mind telling you, I wasn't looking forward to making that 000 call, the Robby fiasco with 423 and his call to 000 was all too clear in my head and I'm afraid I would have lost it if I got the questions Adrian so politely answered. Can you imagine what you would do if confronted with a dopey question like, "Is the person still trapped in the vehicle?" and that was immediately after you explained that the rider had been thrown off a motor cycle. I commented to others at the time that things have changed. When we were taking calls from motorists or the general public via CB, we as monitors, gave our name and ACRM call sign to the operator and explained the situation without question.

Luckily this rider is okay, despite early reports of suspected angina, the person had really had a heart attack requiring a stent to be fitted in hospital.

Now I know this is a big what if but consider this. Firstly what if the Steward had not called for an ambulance and/or secondly the ambulance wasn't forthcoming. Hence the title "What the." You can imagine the rest but it is something like what Chris really said when she came back to the caravan after being told to call Triple Oh. Why Oh? Maybe its "Oh" my God, here we go again.

If this is going to be a pattern then a code word or some other authorisation needs to be worked out to allow the operator to know that the call is genuine and get the help on the way in seconds – not minutes. It used to be identify yourself, explain the situation and provide an address. An alternative is to have someone at SA Ambulance on a normal phone number who can be reached to bypass the Triple Oh bullshit. I'm sure the cost of a call is cheaper than a life.

In the Kitchen with Chris 49

Some more healthy recipes, the first was chosen and submitted by John 232. Almost healthy anyway as there is a bit of decadence chucked in for good measure. The cake started off as a conversation that I just had to follow up.

SPINACH & FETTA CHICKEN BREASTS.

100g baby spinach leaves, wilted and coarsely chopped.

80g soft feta, crumbled

8 slices prosciutto

1 cup frozen peas

¼ cup milk

4 (about 800g) chicken breast fillets

4 Sebago potatoes, peeled coarsely chopped

½ cup sour cream.

2 tsp olive oil

Mix spinach and feta in a small bowl. Cut a small pocket in the side of each chicken breast. Spoon the spinach mixture into each pocket. Wrap 2 prosciutto slices around each chicken breast to enclose filling. Cook the potatoes in a large saucepan of boiling salted water for about 15 minutes or until tender. Add the peas and cook for 1 minute or until heated through. Drain well and return to pan. Use a potato masher or fork. Mash until smooth. Add sour cream and milk and stir to combine. Taste and season with salt and pepper.

Meanwhile, heat the oil in a large frying pan over medium high heat. Add chicken and cook for 4-5 minutes on each side or until golden brown and cooked through. Spoon mashed potato evenly among serving plates. Slice chicken and arrange on the potato and serve immediately. Serves 4.

Phil used to make these but he hadn't heard the recipe exactly and used bacon instead of prosciutto. He also used grated cheese and the result was still great.

GREEN TOMATO CAKE

2 ¼ cups sugar

3 eggs

3 cups flour

1 tsp baking powder

½ tsp nutmeg.

1 cup raisins

coconut (optional)

1 cup vegetable oil or melted shortening

2 tsp vanilla

1 tsp salt

1 tsp cinnamon

1 cup pecans or walnuts

2 ½ cups diced green tomatoes

Method: -Preheat oven to 350°. In a mixing bowl, beat sugar, vegetable oil or shortening, eggs and vanilla until smooth and creamy. Sift together the flour, salt, baking powder, cinnamon and nutmeg; slowly beat into egg mixture. Blend well. Stir in pecans, raisins and tomatoes.

Pour into greased 9x13-inch pan. Top with coconut if desired. Bake for one hour, or until a wooden pick or cake tester inserted in the center comes out clean. Serves 12.

HONEY PRAWN STIR-FRY

1 tblspn sesame seeds	1 ½ cups carrots
1 ½ cups snow peas	1 cup broccoli
½ cup shallots	400g peeled prawns
cooking spray	½ tsp crushed garlic (in jar)
½ tsp crushed ginger (in jar)	1 cup water
1 tsp reduced salt chicken style stock powder (Massel®)	
1 tsp soy sauce 43% less salt	2 tblspns cornflour
1/3 cup honey	

Method: - Toast sesame seeds under griller (be careful as they can burn quickly). When toasted leave to one side. Peel carrots then cut in half lengthways then slice at an angle. Cut snow peas in half on an angle. Slice shallots. Cut broccoli into small florets. To butterfly the raw peeled prawns (this makes the prawns more tender), using a sharp knife run the blade down the back of the prawns being careful not to cut all the way through, scrape out the vein. Rinse prawns. Coat a wok or non-stick frypan with cooking spray, sauté garlic and ginger for 30 seconds, add prawns and cook 2 to 4 minutes (depending on size) until just cooked. Remove prawns from wok, leave to one side. Re-heat wok, add ¼ cup of water, carrots and broccoli, cook for 2 minutes then add shallots and snow peas, cook for 2 minutes. Add stock powder and soy sauce. Combine cornflour with remaining water then add to wok. Add honey, sesame seeds and prawns, combine well.

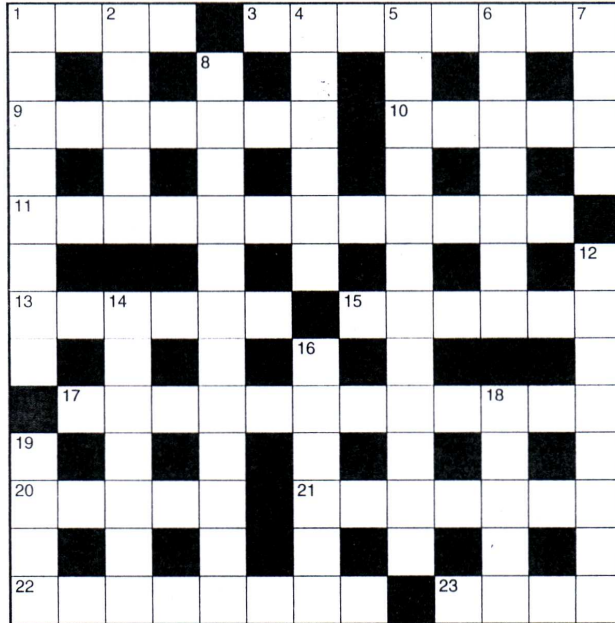
